Location: APB Tutzing, on Lake Starnberg near Munich

We invite scholars from economics and cognate disciplines to submit extended abstracts or full papers. Topics include, but are not limited to impacts of climate change, disasters, and extreme events on:

- Human capital (i.e. health, educational achievements, labor outcomes, gender inequality, etc.).
- Household and firm behavior
- Economic growth
- Agricultural and energy sectors

Preference will be given to papers focusing on Central and Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union.

Accepted participants will be notified by April 15, 2019. Full accepted papers are expected by May 20, 2019.
